Behind the Lines of the Political Battle for Libraries

(\$25 for members, \$30 for non-members). At this session, Chrastka and Sweeney want to share what they learned while working on the battleground of library ballot campaigns. They want to encourage a public dialog among librarians about the importance of politics in our daily routine and to encourage each other to get involved in the fight for library funding at the ballot box. They will also be sharing many of the tips and tricks that national SuperPACs use to build advocacy and coalitions and communities of supporters.





Mr. Chrastka is a former partner in AssociaDirect, a Chicago-based consultancy focused on supporting associations in membership recruitment, conference, and governance activities. He is president of the Board of Trustees for the Berwyn (IL) Public Library (2006 – present) and is a former president of the Reaching Across Illinois Libraries System (RAILS) multi-type library system. Prior to his work at AssociaDirect, he was Director for Membership Development at the American Library Association (ALA). He is a member of ALA as well as the Illinois Library Association (ILA), and is a member of the American Political Sciences Association (APSA). Patrick "PC" Sweeney is a founding Board Member of EveryLibrary (national), Chair of the EveryLibrary California Ballot Committee, and a tireless and innovative advocate for libraries. Since 2010, Dr. Stephens has written the monthly column "Office Hours" for Library Journal exploring the issues, ideas, and emerging trends in library and information science education. 
A. B. Westrick is the winner of the Jeffersop Cup for older readers for *Brotherhood*. Richmond, Virginia lies in ruins in 1867. Fourteen year-old Shadrack is left with no father, a shattered mother and an older brother anxious to take on the role of head of the house.

A. B. Westrick grew up in Pennsylvania and spent most of her summers driving south to visit relatives and camp in state parks. She was an avid reader and liked to write stories but math seemed easier. So off to college she went to become a math major, then a psychology major, and then theology. While encouraging her four children to pursue what they loved she decided to take her own advice and signed up for a creative writing class. In 2006 Ms. Westrick became the Administrative Director of James River Writers. *Brotherhood*, Ms. Westrick's debut novel, has also won the National Council for the Social Studies 2014 Notable Trade Book Award, was an American Library Association 2014 Best Book for Young Adults, a Jane Addams Children's Books Award, and a Junior Library Guild Selection.

The Jefferson Cup award for young readers goes to Matt Phelan for *Bluffton: My Summer With Buster Keaton*. It's 1908 and Henry can't get enough of the star of the troupe of vaudeville performers visiting sleepy Muskegon, Michigan. All Buster Keaton wants to do is play baseball with the boys.

Matt Phelan is an award winning author as well as an illustrator of many books for young readers, including *The Higher Power of Lucky* by Susan Patron. He lives in Ardmore, Pennsylvania with his family. *Bluffton* is his third graphic novel. Phelan won the 2010 Scott O'Dell Award for Historical Fiction for his first graphic novel, *The Storm in the Barn*. Xander's Panda Party by Linda Sue Park is the latest picture book he has illustrated. With a goal of one day writing and directing movies, he studied film and theater in college. However, Matt's first love has always been drawing. In many ways being an illustrator is fulfilling that goal. He is the actor, director, cinematographer and more when he creates a children's book.
