



Practicum Experiences: Core Courses





Practicum Experiences: Foundations

This course provides social, cultural, and historical perspectives on libraries and librarianship. The purpose, functions, and processes of information and library science are explored. Current types of libraries and information agencies are explored including certification and licensure for various specialties. Legal, ethical, advocacy, and economic policies, trends, and positions are addressed.

Practicum expectations:

- Four Library Visits
- One Librarian Interview



Practicum Experiences: Knowledge Resources

Examines the concepts and issues related to the lifecycle of recorded knowledge and information including emerging technologies. Addresses fundamentals of planning, selecting, analyzing, managing, and developing collections and technology resources for diverse communities.

Practicum Expectations: Conduct an analysis using the collection and data from an information setting



Practicum Experiences: Library Management and Leadership

Students will explore the critical issues in leadership and management of a library. They will explore issues involved in building library programs to include considerations of physical space, budgetary decisions, and personnel. Students will develop the skills necessary to plan, establish, and operate a modern library at the building level.

Practicum Expectation: Observe in a library to evaluate some part of the facility and propose a plan to transform some aspect of the library space based on the mission of the entity served by the library.



Practicum Experiences: Knowledge Organization and Access

Course content covers the fundamentals whereby library materials are uniformly described and made available through recognized cataloging, processing, organizing, and accessing of materials. In this course students will develop the ability to apply and adapt the principles of classifying and cataloging, and will understand how these fundamental skills fit into the broader area of technical processing. Use and access or online resources will be a course focus. Content will introduce the organization principles of services in libraries.

Practicum Expectation: 8 hours assisting in a library that uses an OPAC system


