
## Virginia Libraries Survey Results:



Survey sent to VLA listserv, August 2019. 25 respondents representing 17 of 94 Virginia libraries (18% response rate).


# 1. Are you aware of a local League of Women Voters (LWV) chapter in your service area?

5. Has your library ever partnered with a LWV group to promote...  $_{\ensuremath{\text{28 responses}}}$ 




#### PARTNER PROGRAMS, INITIATIVES AND ACTIVITIES:

## What are the benefits or positive outcomes of library partnerships with the League of Women Voters? Summary of 10 responses.

- ★ Recognition of the library as a community player that promotes democracy. By partnering with a non-partisan group, we are maintaining our neutral position.
- ★ Community engagement and public awareness of local civic participation opportunities.
- ★ Patrons and library staff felt that it was easier to educate themselves about local elections.
- ★ LWV members are very knowledgeable and can provide a wealth of resources, like voting information (candidates, registering, etc.) as well as well-researched issues without partisan politics.

"We partner with the League on programs. One ongoing program is called Civic Lab: Dear Elected Official. Civic Labs are informal, lobby-style programs where we partner with organizations to engage and educate the public on a variety of topics...We engage with customers about how they can learn who their elected officials are and how they can communicate with them. Our newest program, Speed Repping @ Your Library, is a joint partnership between the League, Stafford NAACP, National Pan-Hellenic Council of Greater Fredericksburg, and Delta Sigma Theta. We invited all General Assembly candidates to give the public the chance to sign up for one-on-one slots to speak with them. It's modeled after the speed dating concept. This takes place on 10/6/19." CRRL



"I think that customers like having local experts help them navigate the process."


#### How would the outcomes differ without the partnership with the League of Women Voters? Summary of 12 responses.

- ★ Libraries may not initiate voter registration drives and would merely provide information.
- ★ Libraries may not have the resources, expertise or staff time to create voter guides.
- ★ Without this partnership, library voter events would be "less robust." Partnering with the League provides legitimacy to library voter events.
- ★ League members are often more well-versed on answers to questions about voting, local officials.


11. The mission of my library aligns with the mission of the LWV. "Empowering Voters. Defending Democracy." <sup>28</sup> responses Strongly Agree Agree

#### LIBRARY SURVEY CONCLUSIONS:

1. Library awareness about the League of Women Voters is just above 50% and the percentage of responding libraries that do not partner with the LWV is 64.3%. In contrast, 100% of Leagues reported not only being aware but also partnering with their local library. There are 14 local Leagues in Virginia, covering only some geographic areas of the state, whereas there are 94 public libraries serving the entire state of Virginia. This accounts for libraries' lesser degree of awareness of Leagues than the reverse.

2. Libraries partner with Leagues for voter engagement more than any other type of activity.

- 3. Partnerships between libraries and Leagues are mutually beneficial.
- 4. Above all, voter registration and education activities were mentioned as the partner activities that are highly effective and worth replicating. These results concur with the results from the League survey.
- 5. 71.4% of respondents either agree or strongly agree that the mission of the League to empower voters and defend democracy overlaps with the mission of the library. And 96.5% of respondents either agree or strongly agree that the library should play an active role in the community to promote voter engagement, civic participation and solutions to local issues.

#### Don't miss upcoming opportunities to partner with the League of Women Voters for timely and relevant civic

**engagement activities!** Consider programs about the Census 2020, OneVirginia2021 (gerrymandering), the 100th anniversary of the 19th amendment and the LWV. Schedule voter registration drives and collaborate to create voter education tools. Don't have a local League? Start one! 


2. Does your local LWV utilize the services of the local library?

- ★ Provide community outreach



10. The mission of the LWV ("Empowering Voters. Defending Democracy.") aligns with the mission of my local library.





#### LEAGUE SURVEY CONCLUSIONS:

- 1. League members are library users, and Leagues are often library partners. Some librarians are League members and can serve as a liaison between organizations.
- 2. There are a number of partner activities and events that Leagues consider highly effective and worth replicating including voter registration and education, civic dialogue events, displays and book discussions.
- 3. Perceived benefits and positive outcomes of League / Library partnerships:
  - a. Increased visibility in the community and helps to build LWV membership.
  - b. Venue to host events, speakers and partner with other community organizations about important community topics.
  - c. Interfacing with a wider audience, a diverse public and an engaged citizenry.
  - d. Opportunity to provide community outreach.
- 4. Without the League / Library partnership, the League wouldn't be able to achieve as much to engage with as many citizens or raise public awareness. Also, meetings and events would have lower attendance and cost more.
- 5. 100 % of respondents agree or strongly agree that the library is a key community partner and like the League, libraries should play an active role in the community to promote voter engagement, civic participation and solutions to local issues.
