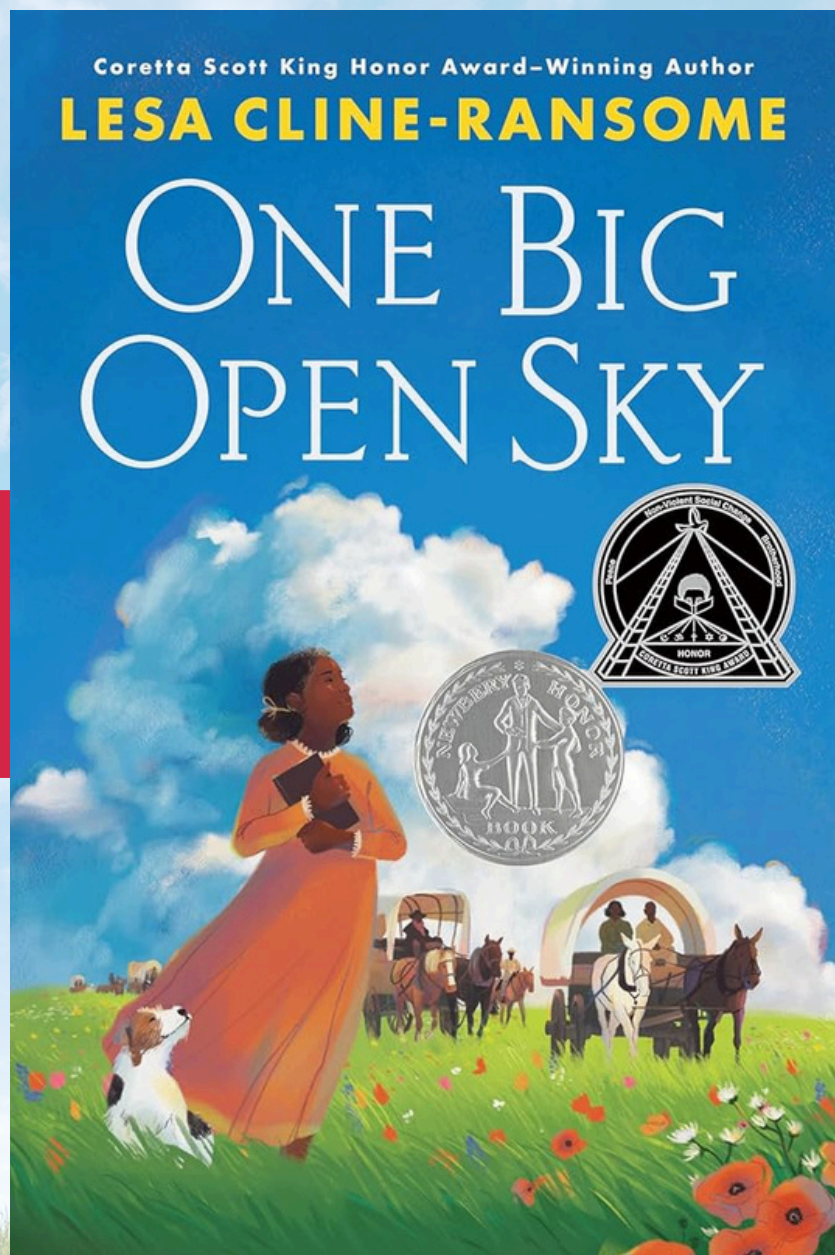
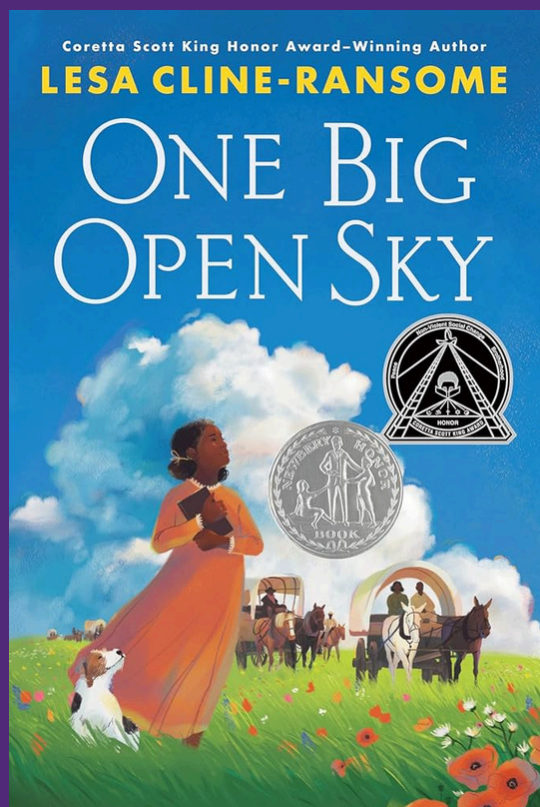

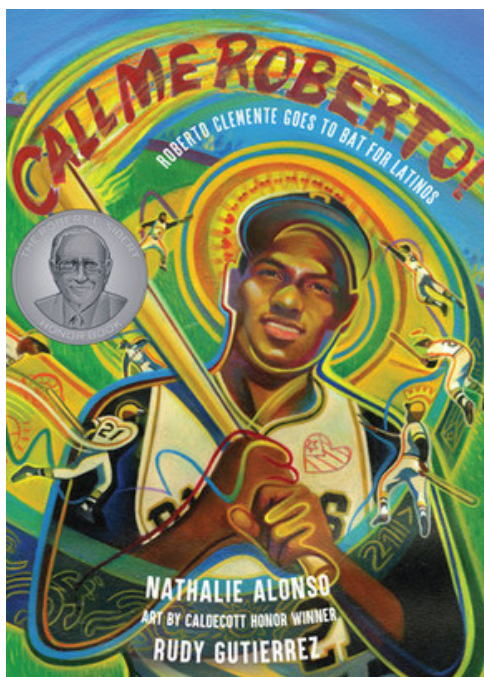

Slavery has ended, but life in Mississippi is still hard. Lettie's father dreams of a better life for his family on their own land in Nebraska. So, Lettie finds herself in a covered wagon, embarking on a perilous journey West. The story is narrated in turns by Lettie, her mother Sylvia, and Philomena, a young teacher who joins the group midway through the journey. This novel in verse does not gloss over the dangers, whether disease, crossing treacherous rivers, facing bandits on the road, or concerns about running out of money and supplies. But families and fellow travelers band together to support each other.

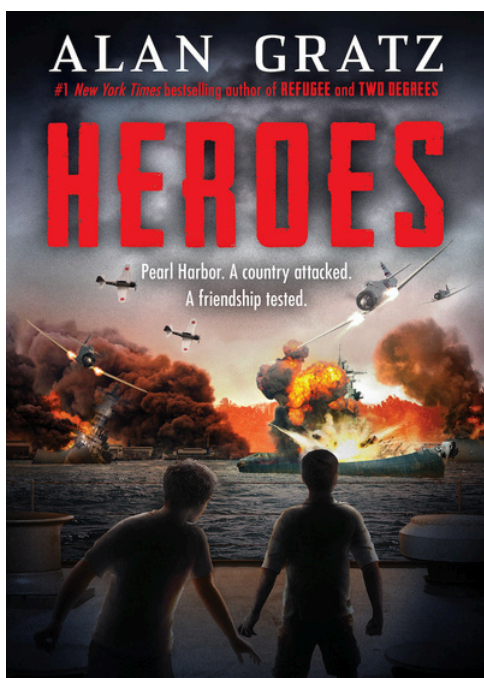
Lettie and her family are part of a larger migration when thousands of black families left the Reconstruction-era South as pioneers seeking a new life in the West when promised freedoms never came. In the end, this is a hopeful story where black families find a freer space to start their lives anew, and the very dangers of pioneer life provide more autonomy for women homesteaders as well. This compelling middle-grade novel in verse shines a light on a little-known chapter of the American pioneer experience.

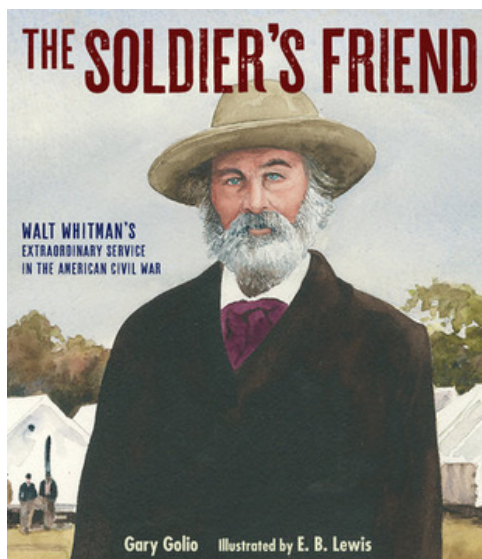
As a boy, Roberto Clemente loved playing baseball, no matter that his bat was a tree branch and a tin can was his ball. He eventually got a chance to play in the Major Leagues but not everyone was happy to see a black man from Puerto Rico, who spoke Spanish, on the baseball field. Reporters mocked his accent, and he was subject to Jim Crow laws, including while at Spring training in Florida. Time and again he pushed back against the prejudice, insisting on being called Roberto and being treated with respect, and became the first Spanish-speaking player named MVP of the World Series. The text in this beautifully-illustrated picture book pays tribute to Roberto's pride in his native language by seamlessly including Spanish words and phrases while celebrating his achievements as one of the most accomplished baseball players of all time.

What makes a hero? What does courage look like? Told against the backdrop of the bombing of Pearl Harbor, this gripping middle-grade novel follows two unlikely heroes as they struggle to survive the attack and help those around them. Can Frank overcome his deeply ingrained fears? Why are people suddenly treating his Japanese-American friend, Stanley, differently? Why is Stanley's mother trying to bury all evidence of their Japanese heritage? The two boys find their experiences paralleling the adventures of the comic superhero they've been creating as they avoid torpedoes and bullets while traversing Pearl Harbor in a tiny boat, first to escape and then to transport wounded men to the medical center. Not only is this an exciting and fast-paced adventure, but it is meticulously researched with additional historical information in the author's note and even comes with a bonus comic!

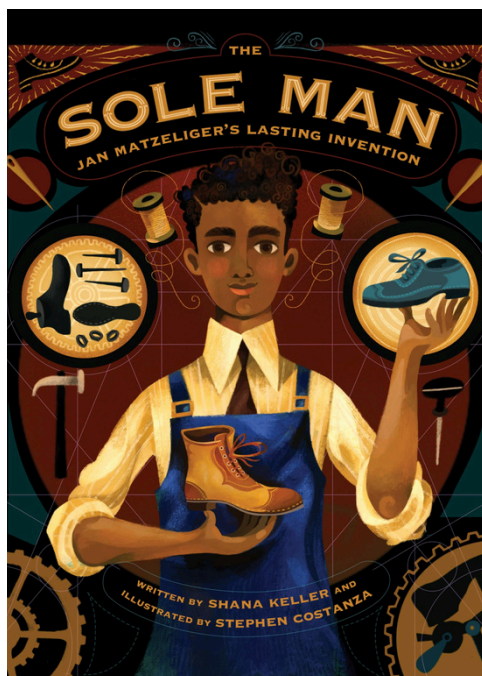

THE SOLDIER'S FRIEND: WALT WHITMAN'S EXTRAORDINARY SERVICE IN THE AMERICAN CIVIL WAR by Gary Golio, Illustrated by E. B. Lewis

Walt Whitman is best known as a poet but this picture book focuses on his extraordinary work as a volunteer in military hospitals in Washington, DC during the Civil War, service that earned him the title "the soldier's friend." When Whitman saw his brother's name on a list of wounded soldiers, he immediately left on a train headed south. While his brother was only slightly wounded, Whitman could not leave behind all of the other soldiers who were suffering. He wrote letters for them, talked with them, and even helped bury those who died. As people around the country learned what he was doing, they sent food and money for supplies for the soldiers. A firm supporter of the Union cause, Whitman came to believe that the truth of war was in the young men who were injured or dying. He cared for all patients, Northern and Southern, looking beyond the uniform to see the humanity of the soldier in front of him. This beautifully illustrated book shows the impact that one person can have on the lives of many.

Few of us can imagine a time when shoes were a luxury, when a skilled hand laster, who sewed each shoe's sole on by hand, could only make 20 to 30 pairs of shoes in an entire week. When Jan Matzeliger suggested building a machine to mechanize and speed up the process, everyone told him it couldn't be done. Luckily, he didn't listen! This picture book biography is an amazing immigrant story, telling how Matzlinger, a Dutch-speaking Black immigrant from South America, invented a machine to fit a shoe's upper part to the last and sew it to the sole of the shoe. His machine could make up to 700 shoes per day, revolutionizing the shoe industry, and his design is still in use today.

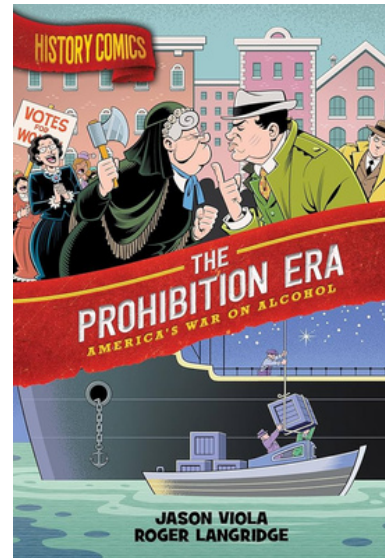
