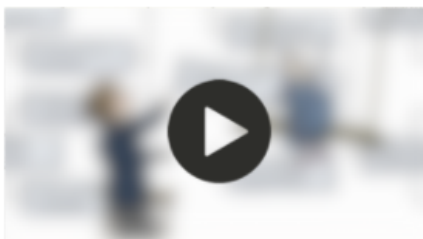

## What is Family Tree and how do I use it?



Introduction to the FamilySearch Family Tree (1:46)

Family Tree is a social network that connects people with their ancestors. This free, community-based family history tool provides a single place for people to store information about their ancestors and collaborate with others working on the same family lines.

All the names, dates, photos, stories, and sources saved in Family Tree will be preserved, making them available for generations to come.

The county was named after [Thomas Colepeper, 2nd Baron Colepeper](#) (1635-1689), Colonial Governor of Virginia from 1677 to 1683. The family name was also spelled "Culpeper."<sup>[2]</sup>

Culpeper was the site of several battles during the American Civil War, and many courthouse papers were damaged or pillaged. Missing records include minute books for 1749-1762, 1765-1797, 1812-1813, and 1817.<sup>[3]</sup>

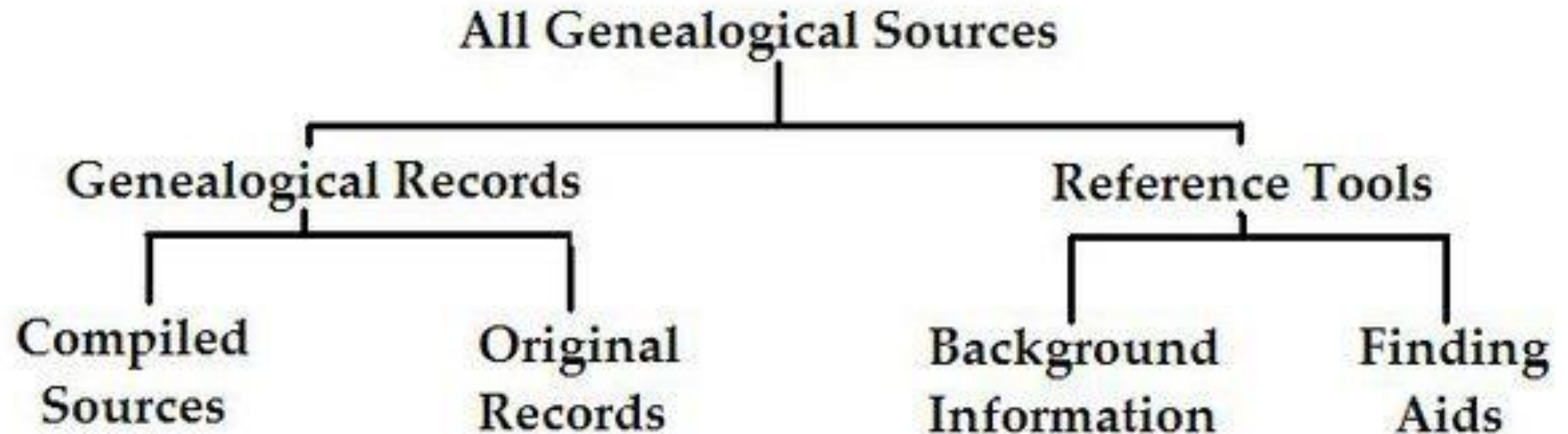

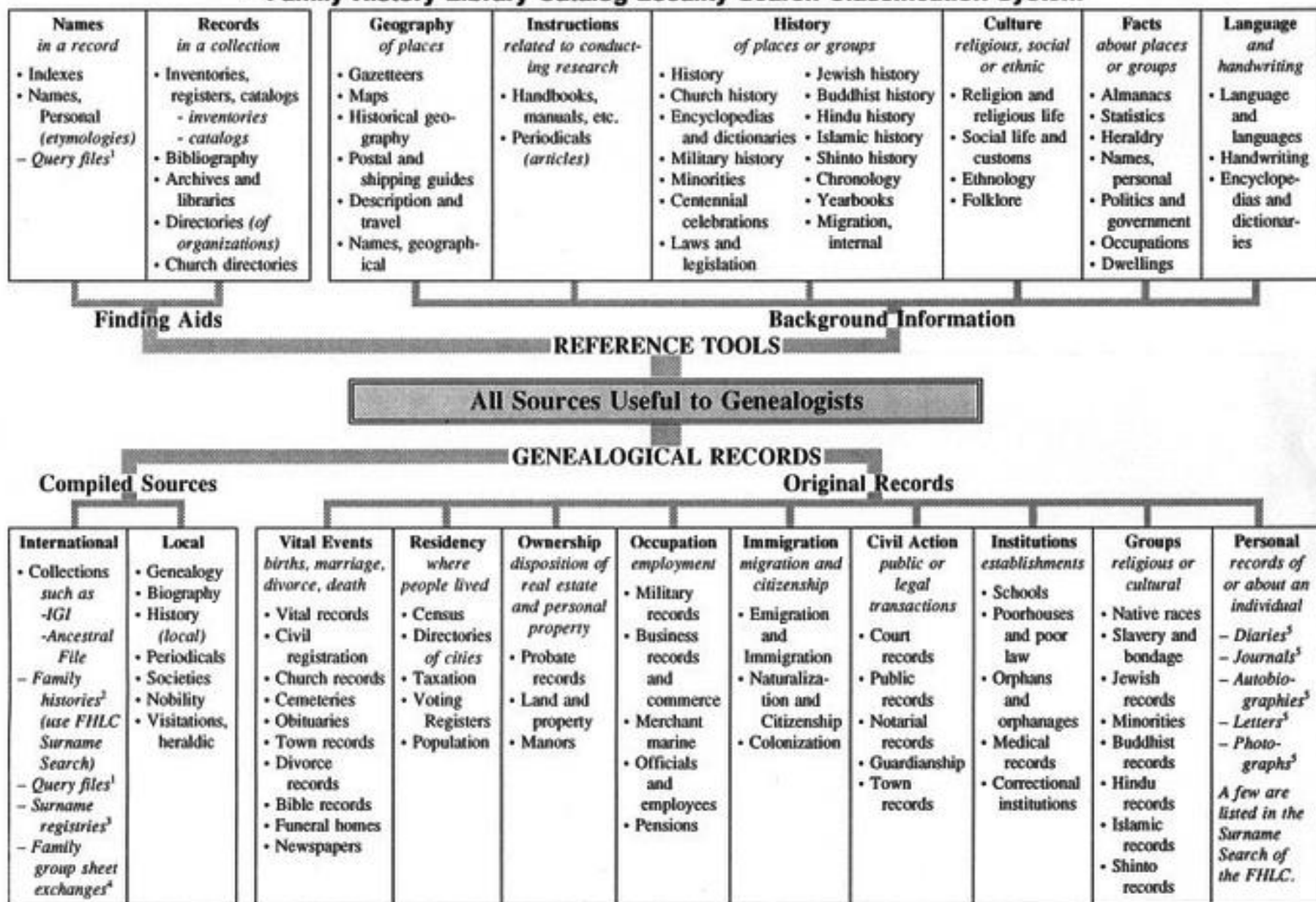
